This experience not only deepened his empathy but also reshaped his approach to crisis negotiation, instruction, and mentorship—bringing an authenticity and depth to his teaching that profoundly resonates.

After retiring in 2017, Adam's passion for teaching and service led him back to the field, and to the classroom. In 2022, he joined the Washington State Criminal Justice Training Commission (WSCJTC) in Seattle as a guest instructor. His skill and commitment quickly led him to a part-time position in 2023, followed by a full-time contracted role in 2024. Upon invitation, Adam ended his contract in 2025, and joined full-time as a Criminal Justice Trainer with the State of Washington.
