

JOSEPH REMY / INSTRUCTIONAL BIOGRAPHY

Joseph Daniel Remy is a Staff Attorney and Program Manager with the National White Collar Crime Center (NW3C), where he develops and delivers training to prosecutors, investigators, and allied professionals across the United States on cybercrime, digital evidence, and emerging technologies. Drawing on more than fifteen years of experience as a prosecutor and legal instructor, he leads curriculum development efforts that support law enforcement's ability to investigate and prosecute complex technology-enabled crimes. His work includes designing computer-based training tools, performing legal research on evolving digital-evidence issues, and contributing to national conversations on best practices for cyber-related investigations.

Before joining NW3C, Remy served as an Assistant Prosecutor in multiple New Jersey counties and as a Deputy Attorney General with the New Jersey Division of Criminal Justice. His prosecutorial career includes extensive experience investigating and trying cases involving cyber intrusions, child exploitation, financial and insurance fraud, human trafficking, and violent crime. He supervised several specialized units—including Cyber Crime, Financial Crime, and Insurance Fraud—and drafted state and federal legislative proposals addressing gaps in criminal procedure, digital evidence access, and victim-centered reforms. Remy began his prosecutorial career as an Assistant District Attorney in the Manhattan District Attorney's Office, where he handled matters ranging from domestic violence and robbery to major cyber-enabled fraud schemes.

Remy is also deeply engaged in national and international professional organizations focused on digital evidence, forensic science, and law enforcement policy. He serves as a member of the Scientific Working Group on Digital Evidence (SWGDE), the International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP) Computer Crime & Digital Evidence Committee, and the American Academy of Forensic Sciences (Digital & Multimedia Sciences Section). He additionally participates in the Organization of Scientific Area Committees (OSAC) and contributes to policy-oriented working groups on artificial intelligence, vicarious trauma, and digital-technology governance. His service includes the NW3C Prosecutors and Judges Committee, multiple legislative advisory committees, and the Board of the New Jersey Coalition Against Human Trafficking, where he previously co-chaired the Legislative Committee.

A sought-after national instructor, Remy has presented at conferences hosted by the National Cyber Crime Conference, the American Academy of Forensic Sciences, the National District Attorneys Association, the Zero Abuse Project, and numerous state law enforcement academies. His teaching covers topics such as digital evidence fundamentals, legal process considerations, mobile-device forensics, international data-access challenges, artificial intelligence issues, and victim-centered approaches to child-exploitation cases. He has also published widely on digital forensics, cloud-based evidence collection, EMS legal issues, and investigative best practices.

Remy is admitted to practice before the Supreme Court of the United States, the International Criminal Court, the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Third Circuit, the U.S. District Courts for the

District of New Jersey and Southern District of New York, and the state bars of New York and New Jersey. He holds certifications including Certified Cyber Crime Examiner, Certified Blockchain Expert, ADF Mobile Device Investigator, and multiple cryptocurrency-investigator credentials. In addition to his legal career, Remy serves his community as a long-time Emergency Medical Technician.
